I feel that they were very proactive in contacting the owner clubs. They provided us with copies of their announcements and arranged to have a conference call between Paul Eskritt and the ACC board members in attendance at Stone Mountain. Paul indicated that it was Fleetwood's intent, with the approval of the bankruptcy judge, to continue supporting their warranty program and retail sales incentives.

I'm writing about this because I respect the fact that they were

quick to communicate with the owner clubs at the time these changes in business occurred. It was also encouraging to hear how important it was to support their current owners through continued warranty support. It's true that American Coach is scaling back their rally support. I can't tell you if it will get better or worse. I can't predict the future of Fleetwood, but I hope that by the time you read this, we will be hearing positive news regarding their operations.

As the RV industry struggles with the current economic climate, there's no doubt that the owner clubs of Fleetwood and American Coach will need each other more than ever. Getting together at rallies and travelling with other owners is a great way to learn more about our coaches, share challenges and help each other. Attending rallies and spending quality time

together is a great way to enhance your ownership

East or West - Great Places to See on Your Way to Decatur

Camp Verde, near Sonoma, is about 40 miles south of Flagstaff on Interstate 17 in Arizona. You might stop there just because there is a really nice big rigs RV park called Distant Drums RV Resort but, plan to stay a couple days and you will see some of the most interesting history of the North American continent.

Tuzigoot
(Apache for
"crooked water") is the
remnant of a
Southern Sinagua village
built between
1125 and 1125.

The original pueblo was two stories high in some places, with 77 ground floor rooms. You can walk through the village and view artifacts at the visitor center.

Montezuma Castle is actually the remnants of a five story cliff dwelling of the Sinagua farmers. It stands in a cliff recess 100 feet above the valley. It was once a 45 room apartment-like building overlooking a creek. If you have been to Mesa Verde National Park, you will recognize the architecture.

Montezuma Well is an amazing place. The well is a lime-

stone sink formed by the collapse of an immense underground cavern. The springs that feed it flow continuously. Sinagua dwelling, much like the ones at Tuzigoot, lined the rim at one time. The water seeps out through an ancient manmade canal and flows into the local creek. The well was beautiful but the creek-side path was

even more peaceful

Local Native Americans still use the well for water to baptize their young

children, believing that all life starts at the well.

If you want to shop, Sonoma is just a few miles up the road from Tuzigoot. But, the nearby Cottonwood and Clarkdale are



great little villages with art galleries and restaurants and less crowds.

> There is also a casino nearby the Distant drums RV Resort (same exit, opposite side of freeway) where we saw RVs parked with their slide-outs out.

When you drive into Kentucky, you might wonder whether to check out the many horse farms or the Bourbon distilleries. Go for the Bourbon!

The Kentucky Bourbon Trail connects the nation's Bourbon distilleries, where you can see the art of Bourbon making being practiced much as it was 200 years ago. Visit the producers of "America's ONLY Native Spirit" and experience for yourself the magic and science of the Master Distiller's craft - all within an easy day's drive through the rolling Kentucky hills.

Don't miss Jim Beam where you will taste the finest bourbon that they make. And, the grandmother of the young girl that pours the fine bourbon has an old southern restaurant so make sure and ask about it. The food is fine.

Makers Mark distillery is the nation's oldest working distillery and has been named a National Historic landmark. Don't even think about tasting; the county is dry. You can, however, buy bourbon and have the cap dipped in its trademark red wax.

At Wild Turkey, you might meet the legendary Jimmy Russell who has watched over the bourbon making process for years. Again, there will be no tasting. They give you lemonade, however.

Heaven Hill distilleries, Four Roses and Buffalo Trace are also on the Kentucky Bourbon Trail. Nearby Bardstown is a historic village and worth visiting for the restaurants and shops.



Easy Recipes for Breakfast

"Breakfast is the easiest meal to make for your sweetheart on Mother's Day.

The easiest breakfast I know how to make is popovers. There are just five ingredients, a bowl, whisk and a muffin pan. But, when those puffed up popovers come out of the oven, everyone will go "Wow!"

Muffins and scones take a few more ingredients but are just as easy and just as impressive. Everyone who has tried this muffin recipe has kept it as a favorite.

Old Fashioned Popovers

1 tablespoon Shortening or non -stick spray coating

2 eggs

1 cup milk

1 tablespoon cooking oil

3/4 cup all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt

Preheat oven to 400 degrees.

Using 1/2 teaspoon for each cup, grease the bottom or sides of 6 cups of a popover or muffin pan or generously spray with non-stick coating.

In a medium mixing bowl, use a wire whisk to beat eggs; beat in milk and cooking oil. Add flour and salt; beat until the mixture is blended but still slightly lumpy. Fill the greased popover cups 3/4 full.

Bake about 40 minutes or until the tops are crisp and brown. Do not open the oven, if possible.

Turn off oven. Using a fork, prick each pop-over to let the steam out. Return to oven for five minutes. Serve hot.



Current Studded Scones

3 cups cake flour

2 tablespoons baking powder

2 tablespoons sugar

3/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup butter, cut into cubes

2 cups whipping cream

1 cup currents

1 egg yolk, beaten

turbinado or raw sugar for sprinkling (if desired)

Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Sift together flour, baking powder, sugar and salt.

Using your fingers or a pastry blender, work butter into flour mixture until mealy.

Add cream and currents and gently mix until dough comes together.

Turn dough onto floured board and roll out to about 3/4 inch thick round disk. Slice disk into 8 to 12 pie shaped pieces.

Carefully place pieces on buttered or parchment lined cookie sheet. Brush scones with beaten egg yolk and sprinkle with sugar, if desired. Bake for 18 to 20 minutes, until golden brown.

Serve with butter and jam if desired.



Apple Carrot Muffins

2 cups flour

1 1/2 cups sugar

1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda

2 teaspoons cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 cups grated carrots

1 cup chopped walnuts

1 cup shredded coconut

1 cup grated Granny Smith apples, skin included (about 2 small)

3 eggs

1 cup oil

2 teaspoons vanilla

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix together flour, sugar, baking soda, cinnamon and salt in a large bowl. Add the carrots, walnuts, coconut and apple and mix together.

In a small bowl, beat together the eggs, oil and vanilla. Add the egg mixture to the large bowl of ingredients and stir until just combined.

Bake muffins for about 25 to 30 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the center comes out clean.

Makes 18 muffins.

New Computer Not in Your Budget?

My Publisher, a photo book making program, was telling me that because I was low on memory, it would be running slower. This was right after I was required to download an upgrade in order to purchase and upload my finished book.

Next, I was downloading a book from *audible.com* and my laptop is telling me there are 34 minutes remaining to upload. I use *Verizon Wireless* for internet access; I was frustrated.



My computer was three years old which is probably 85 in human years but, our budget is telling us that our investments stink right now and a new computer is not on the essentials list. So, I called my son who has a good friend who is a com-

puter wonk and we set up a time for him to access my computer via the internet.

Gerald, the computer wiz, sent me an email with a link to a web site where our appointment was set and after reading the disclaimers and signing off on any liability, he took over my computer from his computer.

We had already purchased and installed a 250 GB external hard drive (\$89.00 at *Best Buy*), partially to back up documents and photos but, also to move them off my hard drive and free up some space. He moved some more stuff to the external drive, downloaded a temporary program to check something.

He said my wireless card was outdated and sent me to Verizon to purchase the new, faster card. It turned out to be free after the rebate and a two year resigning of the contract. My internet speed is now much faster.

He also sent me out to buy one GB of memory which he said should cost no more than \$15.00. He thought I could install it myself by removing probably just one screw from

my computer. This would take care of the memory problem. We found one GB of memory at *Best Buy* for \$17.00. FAQS about ACC

Q. What is the difference between the ACC (American Coach Chapter of FMCA) and ACA (American Coach Association)?
