# Escaping a Fire in Your RV

Recently, an RV fire took the lives of
John and Sue Thomas, long-time
American Coach owners. The fire
started from a front right tire blowout and they were forced to the
rear of their coach. We will never
know why they couldn't escape the
fire, but maybe this would be a
good time to practice your egress in
case of an emergency.



As many of you know, I am a fire safety instructor at FMCA rallies. We just finished the Great Lakes regional rally and while there, Jane and Jerry Lihou and myself made a video showing how to get out of your coach using the emergency window. You can view this video at

It is important that everyone who stays with you in your coach, including your grandchildren, needs to know how to get out in case of a fire.

The first thing you need to do is stand outside your window and see how high it is. How far can you expect to fall. For practice purposes,

you might push the RV park's picnic table under the window.

Next, open your emergency window. This was difficult for Jane and Jerry as they had never opened the fire scape window and it was stuck shut. After much pushing and prodding, it finally came open. They sprayed the rubber trim with *The Solution*, a simple dry wash containing polymer wax, detergent and UV Protectant. You can also use 303 Lubricant. This will make it open easily and you will want to do this a couple times every year.

The emergency window in their American Coach is very large and very heavy. You will want to have a dowel stashed nearby to hold the window open. You can make one or order a "Macadoodle" from my company (soon to be on the web site at www.macthefireguy.com). It would be very difficult to slide through the window space with the weight of a heavy window hanging on top of you.

The window sills are metal so throw a blanket over the edge, corner to

corner, and use it for padding on the way out. The stronger person can hold one end of the blanket, letting the oth-

er use it to slide down.
This blanket will also come
in handy to cover up if it is
cold or you are underdressed.

Going out the window will not be easy because we tend to lose upper body strength as we age. As Jane said, "once my butt was past the sill, the rest of my body just went with

it." She looked at the bruises on her arms as the cost of knowing they will be able to get out when the time comes.

It is a good idea, if you are parked along side the highway, to throw a flare out the window and a few feet away from the coach, so cars and trucks will drive around you and you won't get run over while escaping. These flares are small and won't take up much room next to the bed.

How much preparation you can do will depend on the situation. You may not have time to throw out a flare or even a blanket, but having a solid fire escape plan may help you replace panic with logical, lifesaving actions if a fire occurs.

# **Easy Peasy Summer Recipes**

# Cabbage, Pea and Rice Soup

4 Tbsp butter
1 cup finely minced yellow onion
1/2 large head Savoy cabbage, core removed and thinly sliced
Salt and pepper
2 quarts chicken broth
1 cup Aborio rice
2 lb fresh peas, shelled or 1 1/2 cup frozen peas, thawed
Freshly grated parmesan cheese

Heat the butter over medium heat. Add the onion and cook, stirring, until it is soft but not brown. Add the cabbage and season lightly with salt and generously with pepper, and stir for a few minutes. Add 1 cup of the broth, cover and reduce the heat to low. Let the cabbage stew slowly, stirring occasionally, until it is completely soft and almost wilted, about 15 minutes.

Add the remaining broth and bring to a gentle boil over medium heat. Add the rice and, if using fresh peas add them at this point. Reduce the heat to medium low and cook uncovered until rice is tender but still firm to the bite. If using frozen peas, add them at this point.

Let the soup rest for a few minutes and add more salt and pepper to taste. Serve with a generous sprinkle of freshly grated parmesan cheese.

# Fettuccine with Mortadella, Peas and Mushrooms

1 cup cooked fresh peas or frozen green peas
1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
6 oz mortadella, thickly sliced and cut into 1/4 inch wide strips
1 cup heavy cream or for a lighter version, mix 1/2 cup heavy cream with 1/2 cup chicken stock

Salt and freshly ground pepper to taste

1 Tbsp butterFettuccino for 4 servings1/2 cup freshly grated parmesancheese

Heat the olive oil over high heat. Add the mushrooms and cook, stirring, until they are golden brown. Reduce the heat to medium and add the mortadella and peas and stir a few times. Add the cream and season with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring from time to time until the liquid is reduced by half. Stir the butter into the sauce and turn the heat off.

Meanwhile, cook the pasta in a large pot of salted boiling water until pasta is tender but firm to the bite. Reserve 1 cup pasta water.

Drain the pasta and add it to the sauce. Add half of the parmesan cheese and toss well until the creamy sauce clings to the pasta. Add some reserved pasta water if the sauce seems too thick. Serve with additional cheese.

#### Sand and Solitude





### **American Coach Service Request**

Fleetwood RV is offering to perform minor warranty repairs on your Limited, American Eagle, American Dream, American Tradition, American Allegiance, American Revolution or American Heritage motor home. Time available and the number of coaches in attendance will determine how much service work can be performed at the rally.

Please check in with the service representative scheduler upon arrival. He may need to coordinate your appearance while service is performed.

Please limit problems to two American Coach items and one Spartan item per coach (functional items only). Nonfunctional items and painting will not be addressed at rallies. This is a long-standing policy of the service facility. Additional items will be on a time-permitted basis.

Please explain each item in detail so we can determine whether parts are needed.

Submit this list promptly. Fleetwood must have your request at least two weeks before the rally in order to obtain parts and transport them to the rally.

Repairs will be scheduled in the order that they are received.

Add-on items will be scheduled as time permits.

When requesting chassis repairs, pleas note your coach type of chassis. Some chassis repairs cannot be addressed at the rally and some chassis repairs may be subject to charges to the customer.

Note: Coaches not registered, as part of the rally will not be worked upon until all rally registered coaches have been serviced.

#### Here are some of the changes:

- Parts and labor will be provided at no charge for in-warranty repairs. Labor will be provided at no charge for out of warranty repairs and owner will be notified of charges for parts.
- Because we are not equipped with required fall-protection at rallies, no Fleetwood associate will be allowed to get on top of a motor home roof at any time.
- No Fleetwood associate will be allowed to work under a unit at a rally.
- Repairs requiring lifting/jacking of motor home will not be performed at a rally.
- Certain repairs of doors or windows or windshields cannot be performed at a rally.
- Awning tension adjustments must be done by the awning manufacturer. This includes the replacement of awning fabric.

Chassis repairs must be done by the chassis manufacturer.

#### As has always been our policy, the following are some other items we cannot address at rallies:

- Paint body repairs
- Installing accessories
- Cosmetic/Appearance repairs
- Water filters and maintenance services

Please remember that not every problem can be resolved at the Rally. Should additional work be required at a shop facility, the Service Department will assist you in determining your needs and schedule.

#### **FAQS about ACC**

**Q.** What is the difference between the ACC (American Coach Chapter of FMCA) and ACA (American Coach Association)?

A. All members are owners of American Coach motor homes. The ACC is a chapter of FMCA (Family Motor Coach Association) and you must be a member of FMCA. The ACC has two pre-rallies a year so they may caravan and park together at the FMCA International conventions. Members of ACA do not need to belong to FMCA and are independent from any other membership group. ACA has two national rallies a year and has eleven regional chapters.

**Q.** Can I be a member of both ACC and ACA?

**A.** Yes, most American Coach owners are members of both organizations.

**Q.** Why do I have to be a member of FMCA in order to join the ACC?

**A.** FMCA by-laws require that members of a chapter also belong to the national association.

Q. What are ACC's roots?

**A.** The ACC was started by ACA members that wanted to park together at FMCA events and had their first rally in Gatlinburg, TN in 1993.

**Q.** Are the officers in ACC paid?

**A.** No, they are volunteers and only out-of-pocket expenses are paid.

**Q.** Do I have to be an original owner to have the American Coach service team work on my coach at the rallies?

**A.** No, qualifying service is available to all American Coach owners attending a participating rally.

American Coach Chapter of FMCA consists of members that are owners of an American Coach including American Heritage, American Eagle, American Dream, American Tradition, American Revolution and Limited Motor Homes.

We are the only American Coach chapter of FMCA and provide our members with camaraderie with other American Coach owners. Our primary goals are to foster good relations with the American Coach manufacturing and servicing facility. We bring its management, their technicians and coach owners together.





We meet once or twice a year, immediately preceding each of the FMCA Family Reunions & Motorhome Showcases. There may be a golf tournament, a tour of nearby points of interest, cocktail hours, dinners, pizza nights and more. The American Coach Service Team joins us at our rallies to perform repairs on our coaches. One or more American Coach dealers also join us to display the latest coaches, hopefully sell a few, and participate in the rallies.
